Colleagues:

Welcome to the 2016 TN eCampus Dynamic Digital Development (3D) summer professional development event! It is exciting to see so many members of the TN eCampus community come together to learn, to share best practices, and to exchange ideas.

In the last year there have been many changes, chief among them the rebranding of ROCC/RODP as TN eCampus. This new name reflects a belief that students across Tennessee deserve access to high quality online courses that are accessible, engaging, and relevant. Dedicated to this mission, TN eCampus has selected the top 75 highest enrollment courses for redevelopment in the first wave of an initiative known as eQual. The eQual initiative will place TN eCampus courses on a cyclical schedule for review and redevelopment and gives developers of those courses an opportunity to hone their skills and try new techniques in teaching online. This second annual 3D event signals the launch of eQual and the coming together of developers for the courses that impact the most students.

The theme of 3D this year is "Partners in the Process." We value you as our partner in the process of developing and redeveloping courses to create the best possible learning experience for our students. For our part, 3D this year has been expanded to include more sessions on more topics, specifically for course developers. The information presented at 3D is designed to supplement the basic course developer training you may have participated in or will soon receive. 3D is just one example of new supports available to course developers. In the coming weeks, you will hear more about our new performance support initiatives: the Course Developer Program (CDP), which replaces the former Course Developer Training; the Learn Lab Community (LLC) online community of practice; the Knowledge Base for Course Developers, an online reference guide; an updated iTeach for new instructors; and the introduction of new tools and templates – all intended to guide and support you throughout the course development process.

TN eCampus would not be possible without the courses and programs that you all work so diligently to design, develop, and continually refine. Since its inception in 2001, TN eCampus has grown from just 63 online courses to a catalog of over 500 courses, including over 30 degree and certificate programs ranging from associate to master's levels. Enrollments grew 88% from 2001 to 2011, and now TN eCampus counts nearly 20,000 enrollments per semester in the 2015-2016 academic year. This growth is an indicator of the increasing demand for access to education that meets the needs of an increasingly diverse student population. It is imperative that we continue to work together if we are to fill this need.

In closing, I want to thank you again for joining us at Dynamic Digital Development and for your dedication and service throughout the year. As partners in the process, I believe we have the potential to continue to transform the face of online education in Tennessee.

### Dr. Thomas J. Tobin

Thomas J. Tobin is the Coordinator of Learning Technologies in the Center for Teaching and Learning (CTL) at Northeastern Illinois University in Chicago. In the field of online-course and -program quality, he is best known for his work on administrative-evaluation techniques; his article on "Best Practices for Administrative Evaluation of Online Faculty" (2004) is considered a seminal work in the field, and has been cited in more than 150 publications. His latest work is *Evaluating Online Teaching: Implementing Best Practices* (Wiley, 2015) with B. Jean Mandemach and Ann H. Taylor. He is currently writing *Reach Everyone, Teach Everyone: A Practitioner's Guide to Universal Design for Learning in Higher Education*, expected from West Virginia University Press in 2017.

Since the advent of online courses in higher education in the late 1990s, Tom's work has focused on using technology to extend the reach of higher education beyond its traditional audience. He advocates for the educational rights of people with disabilities and people from disadvantaged backgrounds.

Tom serves on the editorial boards of *InSight: A Journal of Scholarly Teaching*, the *Online Journal of Distance Learning Administration* and the *Journal of Interactive Online Learning*, and he is an internationally-recognized speaker and author on topics related to quality in distance education, especially copyright, evaluation of teaching practice, academic integrity, and accessibility/universal design for learning.

**Next Steps: eLearning Design with Access for All in Mind**

The Individuals with Disabilities Education Act (IDEA) originally enacted by Congress in 1975, ensured children with disabilities have the opportunity to receive a free appropriate public education. Over the years, our educational settings and physical learning environments have changed, but has our thinking around instructional delivery changed as well? This closing keynote presentation will remind participants about the concept of Universal Design for Learning (CAST, 2014) from Thomas Tobin in his opening keynote and expand on this notion to include usable information, resources and flexible educational materials as next step strategies.
